Giving up & Giving Back: Reclaiming Lent

e have come to one of my favorite seasons of the church year—Lent. I know, I know. This is a bit odd. Most people dread the idea of Lent. One friend of mine is fond of saying "I have given up Lent for Lent." He objects to the season so much he refuses to even acknowledge that it is happening. Lent is a season of penitence, self-denial, fasting and forgiveness. Color and decoration are stripped away from the church. It is no wonder that people are not really fond of Lent. But I don't think of Lent as an opportunity for depression—I see it as an opportunity. I have heard Lent referred to as the bright sadness; the springtime for the soul. It is a time of new life and growth pushing up through the soil of our hearts—reaching towards the sunlight that will shine on it at Easter.

So how can we reclaim Lent this year? How can we make this season of the church year a significant part of our spiritual lives? First, stop giving things up for the sake of giving something up. Giving up chocolate, television, gadgets, Internet, fast food, or any number of other things that people give up just to say that you are denying yourself some thing is missing the point of the discipline. Lent becomes a season of inconvenience rather than a spiritual discipline. Giving things up for Lent with the ulterior motive of losing ten pounds or breaking some bad habit also misses the point. It makes the season about you rather than about your life with God. If that is what Lent has become then I agree with my friend. Let's give up Lent for Lent.

I have found meaning in the idea of giving up and giving back. Let me try to explain what I mean through a few examples. Fasting is one way. Now, I am not much of a faster. I love food and to go a whole day without food is next to impossible for me. So during Lent I may choose to fast just at lunch time. I give up lunch but, and more importantly, I give that time I would have spent eating back to God. I take my lunch hour (or half hour, or fifteen minutes—whatever time I would have spent

eating) and I spend it with God—I pray, I read scripture, I read other sacred texts, I sit in a church or chapel in silence. The point is what I give up I replace with time spent with God. My fast itself becomes a feast—a feast of God's gracious love and presence.



But I also remember that I am called by Christ to not just love God but also love my neighbor. To that end, I keep track of what I would have spent on that lunch. Each day that I observe my fast of lunch, spending time with the Holy One, I keep

track of what I would have spent on food. On Good Friday I donate that amount of money to Episcopal Relief and Development. This is just one example of a way to give up and give back. The important part of the discipline is that what I am giving up provides time to

spend with God in prayer, study or service to the world. Don't want to miss a meal—how about giving up a favorite television show. Use that half hour or hour you would be watching television to read, study and/or pray.

I keep threatening to declare what I have deemed a "half-price fast" for Lent one of these years. My idea is that I determine what I would like to order off a menu and calculate how much I would spend. I then divide that amount in two—one half is mine to order from the menu. This will require changing my order and eating less. The other half of what I would have spent is then saved and sent to Episcopal Relief and Development on Good Friday. It is a half-price fast. I only spend half of what I would have on food during these forty days so that I can give the other half away. Each meal would provide an opportunity to remember that God calls us to care for those who are hungry in this world. This is just an idea that has been rattling around in my heart for a while. I may just try it this year.

back from summer. Although we had
organized a ministry procession during Henry
Atkins's time here, the Vestry agreed that

out the ministry signs.

There have been a number of changes in the parish composition during the past few years. Some ministries had died and others had been born. It was important that we, the congregation, see that life at St. Mike's exists in a new and vibrant way. Our seeing that vibrancy is just as important as Dan Justin seeing it. Actually, perhaps we need to see it more. He probably already knew it.

So there we were, that February 5th, with 20 different parishioners, each carrying a different ministry sign, showing ourselves and the new Rector, that we are ready for a new era. If you were not there that day, but want to involve yourself in St. Mike's, there is a ministry that is just right for you and here is a list of a few of them: Stewardship, Children's Church, Finance



Committee, Lectoring, Food Pantry, Healing Prayer, Wig Washing, Altar Guild, Ushering, Acolyting (at the 8:00) or Master of Ceremonies (at the 10:30), Youth Group, Community Outreach, Book Discussion, Soldier Care, Solar Outreach, Pastoral Care, Hospitality, and PRISM. There is a place for each of us. We just have to find it.


Pizza Pizza Party!


