## The Three Great Days

am a person who loves to tell stories. I love stories. I relate to the world through stories. I think this is one of the reasons that I love being a priest so much. My job is to be a storyteller. Of course I get to tell great stories in my sermons about lots of different experiences. But I tell those stories because they help me tell the real story. In fact, all that we do in the church is about telling the real

Have you ever noticed it? The calendar tells the story—we start with Advent and Christmas and tell of the coming of the Christ Child. We move to Epiphany where we tell the story about who Jesus really is and how God is revealed to the world in the person of Jesus. Then comes Lent and we tell the stories of how Jesus taught and challenged the religious practices of the day—so much so that it will eventually get him killed. And now the story continues in Holy Week as we tell the stories of the last moments of Jesus' life. We tell how he loved his disciples and taught them to be servants by washing their feet. We tell how Jesus used bread and wine to remind the world of whom he is and what he did. We tell how he was arrested in the garden, put on trial, was humiliated, beaten and nailed to a cross. We tell the story of his death knowing deep down that the story does not end there.

Holy Week and the liturgies of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Great Vigil of Easter (known as the Triduum—the Three Great Days) help tell this story. But it is more than that. Through these ritual acts and rites we become participants in these stories. By participating the liturgy we know that these events are not some distant memory or myth but rather that these events still make all the difference in the world. We are a part of them. We are active participants. We join the disciples in the Upper Room as we celebrate the Eucharist within the context of the Agape Supper. We understand our own calling to serve as we wash each other's feet. We see our own inability to wait and watch with Jesus in the garden by witnessing the stripping of the altar and praying at the Altar of Repose.

We experience the ugly truth of the matter that we are part of the crowd which cries "Crucify Him!" on Good Friday. We experience the emptiness of that dark day as we come to church only to discover that the Sacrament is not available to us this day. We tell the story. We are participants in the story. And it is the only story that matters.



Storytelling is the key feature of the Great Vigil of Easter which is the most important service of the entire year. If you don't attend any other service this year attend the Great Vigil of Easter. All other liturgies of the year flow out of and from the Easter Vigil. It is

the climax. We hear the stories of creation, liberation, new life, and hope. We hear the story of what theologians call the Salvation History and find our place in it. We experience the message of John—that light comes into darkness and the darkness is unable to overcome it. The Great Vigil begins in a dark church into which is brought a new fire; a new light. That light spreads as each person lights their own candles. We witness the power of the resurrection as we come to the font and witness new life given in baptism. We proclaim "Christ is Risen!" and know that we can never be separated from the love of God again. We experience it as the darkness is finally thrown off, the lights come on, the vestments change from red to white and we celebrate Easter joy! We tell the story. And the story tells us that in the end—God wins!

Holy Week begins Sunday, April 1st with Palm Sunday. It continues here at St. Michael and All Angels on Thursday, April 5th with Maundy Thursday at 6:30 p.m., on April 6th with Good Friday and Stations of the Cross at 12:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m., on April 7th with the Great Vigil of Easter at 7:30 p.m.

This is the Triduum—the Three Great Days. And you will not want to miss them!

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## Parish Clean-Up Day, a Recent St. Michael's Tradition

bout two or three years ago the first Parish Clean-Up Day was organized by Ed Sugar and Preston Fray. Both were members of the Vestry and also were on the Building and Grounds Committee. They had noticed that the sanctuary needed some serious attention. They scheduled the event for the Saturday before Palm Sunday so that the sanctuary would shine and sparkle for Easter.

About 10 people showed up at 9:00 am and quickly got to work. Ed and Preston had already set up all the needed equipment and materials. We cleaned the carpet, washed the floors, cleaned the pews, washed the windows (both inside and outside), dusted the altar and choir area, and cleaned anything that needed to be cleaned. It was hard work and we were amazed at how much dust had

accumulated. In spite of the work we all had a good time. Nothing can compare to the sense of fellowship and accomplishment one has when viewing the results of community labor.

This first Clean-Up Day sparked additional efforts to spruce up the sanctuary. Tom Heuer refinished the benches at the altar and, later, refinished the altar rail. Some of the pews were repaired and, eventually, the carpet was replaced.

The second Clean-Up Day was scheduled for the Saturday after Thanksgiving. We wanted to have everything in great shape for Advent and Christmas. I arrived that morning expecting a similar amount of work as the previous April. I was quite surprised to find only a fairly light amount of work needed to be done.

We also decided that day to just wash the inside windows as the rainy season would (hopefully) soon arrive.

Now, the Parish Clean-Up Days (always the Saturday after Thanksgiving and the day before Palm Sunday) are a wonderful St. Michael's tradition. The next Clean-Up Day is Saturday, March 31st from 9:00a.m. to noon. All are invited to spend the entire morning or, to just come for an hour. We will find light maintenance rather than heavy cleaning and it is an opportunity to give a little back to God for all the wonderful blessings that have been bestowed on St. Michael's.

## Our Sponsored Families

We need people to help us with ongoing support. Here are their stories and needs:

Sponsored Family #1: A mom, only 29 years old, with six kids (ages 3 to 14) living (squatting) in South LA. She was brought here from Mexico as a teen and put straight to work. The father of her kids was extremely abusive and she escaped him, living for awhile in a car, now a house with no heat or air conditioning. We are working to get her citizenship expedited and find her housing as well as helping her to get her kids into charters and magnets and we got the two oldest kids a "big brother" and "big sister". They have been on a wait list for a year and a half hoping for housing in a better neighborhood. Ideally we'd love to find them a guest house in a really nice neighborhood. Mom can offer \$500 rent plus housekeeping services in exchange. It is mom's dream to see her kids have the best education and safest housing they can. She is beyond a survivor. Her kids are angels and amazing students. Please, if you know of an empty-nester that might be willing to take in this family for a year or so until she gets on the road to citizenship,

it would make their lives so much better. The family can use deliveries of groceries, cash, payment of their internet bills (mom keeps up with housekeeping jobs this way) and gift cards to local stores. Mom also sells a make-up line door to door and cleans houses.

Sponsored Family #2: A mom and small baby boy. Mom recently paid for a low income housing somewhere in the Inland Empire. When they entered the apartment things looked great but after a very short time it became evident that there was a severe roach infestation. The insects were swarming all over everything and the complex would do nothing to address the situation. The health risks were too severe for the baby in that place and so they have moved out. The complex is not willing to give mom any money back—this is a loss of just over \$800. Mom is living on only \$412 per month already so this is a significant loss. She was then staying at the Super 8 Hotel on Laurel Canyon but has now moved in with her mother in a senior care facility. Both she and her mother could be fined if anyone knew she and the baby were there. Again, a room

rental in a house or small guesthouse on a property for \$400 a month for at least a year would help this mom and child survive. She can always use cash, gift cards and donations of groceries.

**Sober House:** In North Hollywood—about 12 women making their way back into society after being in rehab. These women need basic grocery and paper staples once a month.


