What Would Jesus Do?

or years now people have been wearing little bracelets or necklaces with the initials WWJD—What Would Jesus Do? The intent of the bracelet is to inspire the wearer to reflect on their choices when faced with a dilemma. What would Jesus do in this situation?

While I kind doubt the effectiveness of these bracelets, the thought behind them is actually legitimate. One of the goals of the Christian life is to model our life on the life of Jesus. In Christ we see what it means to be truly human. In Christ we find the exemplar of love. Jesus gave his followers a new command—to love one another. In other words, we are to seek to live like Jesus lived.

One of the primary reasons we attend church is for spiritual growth. The Bible calls this growth sanctification—it is the process of God working in our lives to make and mold us into the people that God longs for us to be. It is the process by which our lives begin to look more like Jesus' life. As we grow spiritually we will begin to reflect God's love to the world.

The Holy Spirit is doing the work of sanctification in each of us. But even though that is true, we can also be intentional about that work. We participate in that work. In the book of James we heard the reminder—"Draw near to God, and God will draw near to you." (James 4:8a). We are active participants in our own spiritual growth. And we can engage in all kinds of activities that facilitate that growth. We open our hearts, minds and hands to the work the Spirit is doing in us.

My goal as your rector is to help you grow spiritually. That is why I am introducing a new program here at St. Michaels. It is designed to foster this growth by providing ample opportunity for learning, experimenting, and serving. I am calling it *The Generous Living Project*.

I believe "Generosity" is another way to describe the love that Jesus modeled. Jesus gave. He gave all that he could give. He gave to all he encountered. He gave healing, acceptance, hospitality, forgiveness, freedom, and redemption. We are the recipients of his gracious giving as well. We experience and live in his generosity every day. Jesus says "Love one another." But I believe that could just as easily be phrased "Be generous to one another." I say that because in the Bible love is always a verb. Love is an action. It is an act



of generosity. Being generous is far more than just giving of our money. It is also the giving of kind words or being hospitable and opening our home to others. It can mean giving of our time or it could be taking time to pray for others. It includes being willing to listen

to someone or visit one who is sick or lonely. Generosity could be risking ourselves, our reputations, or even our safety to stand up for peace and fight against injustice. All of these examples, in addition to giving money, are ways we can be generous.

Each month, beginning with October, *The Generous Living Project* will have a different theme with an activity, learning opportunity and/or outreach opportunity. These themes will represent some of the aspects of what it means to be generous. The goal of the Project is to become more like Christ by the end of the program year; to become more generous people by June of 2013. Are you willing to open your heart to the Spirit's work in your life? Are you interested in working on your own

In addition to this basic structure, much of the group's details and objectives have yet to be defined. Members will have a big influence in how the group is organized and run.

St. Michael and All Angels is currently in a wonderful period of growth and transition. So is this young adult group. So are we as young adults.

The young adult group will meet on the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30 pm in the new ministry center. Our first meeting will be Wednesday, October 3. Please bring a snack to share.

Stewardship

e are entering into Stewardship season, which, after 23 years of attending the Episcopal Church, has become a familiar ritual to me. However, being raised Roman Catholic, this wasn't always the case. Growing up, I recall attending Sunday services with my sister. Our parents always gave us \$1, which we dutifully placed in the Sunday collection plate. This would have been in the mid-6os, and at the time, my parents may have considered \$1 a week a lot of money.

In 1989, when I began to attend the Episcopal Church, the concept of pledging was new to me, as this never was part of my Roman Catholic upbringing nor experience. Whereas the concept of pledging, the act of making a commitment to the church and to God, was new to me, it made perfect sense, as I have been a person of faith throughout my entire life. What better way, I thought, to truly place my faith in God, to trust that He would provide, than to make a pledge to the church.

At first, I decided to best my parents' \$1 per week by pledging \$5 a week (\$260/year). After that first year, I realized that \$5 was very manageable, and challenged myself to double it to \$10 per week (\$520/year). A year later I thought, let's see if I can double it to \$20 per week, which I did. At that point, I felt pretty good that I was pledging \$1040 a year to the church.

In 1991, my Rector, the Rev. Jon Bruno (our current Bishop), asked me to serve as Stewardship Chair, which I gladly accepted. However, once I began to do a bit more studying and reflecting in preparation for the Stewardship Campaign, I realized that my yearly pledge was just a start. Whereas I

had been perfectly content with \$1040 a year, I finally began to view my pledge in terms of the tithe. Here I was, about to talk to the congregation about pledging and tithing, yet I had never considered the percentage of my own giving. I soon realized that my yearly pledge was a far cry from 10%. In reality, I knew that I could afford to give more and I also knew that I wasn't quite ready to commit to giving 10%. From that day forward, I vowed to challenge myself, to set an example, by working towards the tithe.

Fast-forward 21 years...every year since 1991 l have increased my pledge as I worked towards the tithe. Each year, as I completed my pledge card, I knew that my increased pledge was an act of faith, that I was trusting God to provide. I feel that I am proof that God has been my support and my guide. FYI—currently, David and I pledge 10% of our net income or 7.5% of our gross income. I state both because there always seems to be the question—on which amount do you base the tithe, gross or net? Whereas pledging 10% of our net income can be considered to be doing our part, I know that, when it comes to giving to God and the church, we can do better. Therefore, we will challenge ourselves to increase our pledge as we continue to work towards 10% of our gross income. I also know that it may take us several years to achieve this; what's far more important is that we've set this as our goal.

Although I'm far from a Biblical scholar and couldn't quote a scripture verse if you paid me, I believe there's great truth in the following:

"The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

2 Corinthians 9:6-7

I willingly choose to sow bountifully. I do it, not out of guilt, nor obligation, rather as a personal covenant with God. It is a great thing to know that I can place my trust, my life, if you will, into God's hands, and that He is willing to carry the burden.

Crucial Conversations Begin Wednesday, October 24

St. Michael and All Angels Peace and Justice Committee introduces Crucial Conversations this month. Crucial Conversations takes up issues of peace and justice providing a community forum for exploration and discussion.

Our first Crucial Conversation will be held on Wednesday, October 24, 2012, at 7:00 pm in the Ministry Center. Our topic this month:

A Matter of Life and Death: A Conversation on the Death Penalty

Since the 1950s the Episcopal Church has expressed its opposition to capital punishment. This November voters will be asked to



consider Proposition 34, sponsored by SAFE California. If passed, Prop 34 will replace the death penalty in California with life in prison without the possibility of parole. Join the Rev. Dennis Gibbs, a representative of SAFE California, and a man sentenced to death row who was later proven innocent as they lead us in this Crucial Conversation.

A Note on Stewardship

S o much has happened over the past year. We have called a new rector, we have completed a mini capital campaign, we have renovated much of our facility, and we have welcomed new members. Our finance committee has reported that the parish is no longer in red. In the beginning of 2012, we expected to have a budget deficit of approximately \$130,000 which would have to come from our reserve funds. Due to the hard work of the finance committee and vestry—that is no longer true. We won't have to touch our reserve. We are in a very different place now from where we were just one year ago. We are no longer a struggling parish. We are a strong, vibrant and growing parish. God is at work in this place. It is a new day. And we believe that God is calling us to do even more.

Now is the time to begin to grow our

ministries. As we look ahead to 2013 we dream of strengthening our worship services and our music program. We see the needs of the world around us and feel God's leading to strengthen our outreach ministries. We know we must begin build up our Mission Share Fund in order to give to the Diocese of Los Angeles the full 12% we are asked to give. While there have certainly been amazing renovations, we know there are still many areas of deferred maintenance on our campus.

We give in response to God's love and grace in our lives. We give back to God as an act of worship. We give because through giving God makes us into the generous people God calls us to be. But the practical side of giving is that we can build and grow our ministries allowing us to be the church. Did you know that in 2012 our budget for our

music program, excluding salaries for Kristen and Emil and instrument maintenance, was \$-0-? The music program relied on fundraisers. Did you know that our Outreach budget has been greatly reduced and it also has relied on fundraising? Imagine what we could do if we could fully fund these ministries through our budget. Imagine what we could do if we each increase our giving. Let's end the need for additional fundraising. We seek to fully fund our music and outreach budgets.

We are not asking for equal gifts—we understand that not everyone has the means to give the same amounts. We are asking for equal participation though. We are praying that 100% of the people and families of St. Michael's choose to make a financial commitment. After all, being a pledger is one half of what it means to be a member.

Work Is Progressing in the New Ministry Center




An Important message about the Coldwater Construction and Parking

This month the construction project on Coldwater Canyon Avenue creeps closer to the church. The potential impact on St. Michael's is that drivers may lose the ability to turn left onto Hacienda Avenue from the southbound lane. This will impact access to the lower parking lot.

We are currently working LADOT and Harvard Westlake School to maintain the right to turn left onto Hacienda. In the event that we are unable to turn left onto Hacienda Avenue drivers may:

- Park in the St. Michael's upper lot accessed from Avenida del Sol.
- Drivers may use theupper lot accessed from Avenida del Sol to turn around and return to Hacienda where they are can access the road by making a right turn.
- Drivers may turn left into the main entrance of Harvard Westlake.
 Take the first right and drive to the end of that parking lot to gain access to the church lot. Please see map at the right this option.
