Buy Less. Give More

t is that time of year again. The days are shorter. The temperature is cooler. The houses and yards are covered in lights and decorations. And the stores are jammed beyond capacity. From Black Friday to Christmas Eve finding a parking spot in a lot even near a retail store is kind of like winning the lottery. Shopping seems to consume us. It is certainly good to give gifts to those we love and appreciate. Most of us will receive gifts from those who love us and appreciate us as well. Generosity is never a problem at this time of year. But it all does make me stop and think for a moment. Does the person I am buying a gift for really even need it? Sometimes I find myself agonizing over the question – what do I buy someone who already has all they need? These days, when I am asked about what I want for Christmas the answer is always "I don't know. I don't really need anything."

This is why this year my family and I have decided to buy less and give more. We have decided not to purchase gifts for one another that we don't really need. Instead, we are going to donate the money we would have spent to help those who are in greatest need. I plan to use the Episcopal Relief and Development program called "Gifts for Life." These are all sorts of opportunities to donate money to help people obtain things like clean drinking water, mosquito nets to help fight malaria, food distribution sites, sustainable gardens, wells, access to education, and a whole host of other life-saving and lifechanging services. We are giving up our own gifts and we are giving to those who need it most.

As you know, this year at St. Michael and All Angels, we are participating in the Generous Living Project. Our goal is to grow spiritually becoming the generous people God calls us to be. Our theme for the month of December is Buy Less, Give More. I invite each of you to consider ways that you can celebrate Christmas this year through generosity. Consider the Episcopal Relief and Development Gifts for Life Program. Of course there are plenty of local needs as well.

Our own Holiday Cheer is a great way to buy less, give more. Over the next week or two, if

people ask you what you want for Christmas, give them the name of a child who will attend the Holiday Cheer event. Each child who attends will receive a toy and an outfit. For many of them the gifts they receive at Holiday Cheer are the only gifts they will receive



they will receive this year. Instead of giving you a gift you don't really need – encourage your friends and family to give to those in greatest need.

The Advent Conspiracy is another nationwide effort to assist in this kind of project. It calls

Christians of all different denominations to "Join the conspiracy." Their primary project is donating to help provide clean water to people who have none.

And by the way, you can always still give something to those you love and appreciate. Episcopal Relief and Development produces cards which read "A donation of \$____ has been given in your name..." The card explains what the money was given for. I have made my own cards like this. Instead to giving a gift to a person that has everything they could ever want, I make them a card which explains that I donated money or a gift in their name to help those in greatest need. I can honestly say that I have never had anyone upset by this kind of gift.

We gather as a community to honor, pray for, and bless those members or friends for whom this holiday is difficult. And of course, all are welcome to attend – even if you are not blue this Christmas. Join us as we pray for others.

The Blue Christmas service will take place on Wednesday, December 19, 2012 at 7:00 pm in the church.

A "Very" Odd Addition

Vou may have noticed something odd added to my title in our Sunday bulletins. It is the addition of the word "Very" to my title. Yes, I am now officially the Very Reverend Dan Justin.

Our diocese is actually divided up into a number of deaneries. St. Michael and All Angels is located in Deanery 2. Each deanery has a dean appointed by the bishop to assist the bishop with the pastoral care of the clergy who work in that deanery. In addition, each deanery elects both clergy and laity to represent their deanery at Diocesan Council. The point of all this is to help disseminate information and improve communication between the parishes of a deanery and the diocese. When a priest is named Dean they get the honorific "Very" added to their title.

Earlier this year I was in my office working away, minding my own business, when the phone rang. It was Bishop Glasspool. She informed me that the current dean of Deanery 2 had resigned his position and that she was planning to reinvent the position moving forward. She did not want one person to be deanshe wanted two people to serve as co-deans. She asked if I would be willing to serve along with the rector of Trinity Parish in Lancaster, CA as codeans of Deanery 2. I agreed to this appointment. In early November, at the pre-convention meeting of Deanery 2, the Rev. Nancy Brown and I were officially commissioned as co-deans by Bishop Glasspool. Both Nancy and I each received a beautiful Celtic cross to wear as the symbol of the office we hold together.

As a result of all of this—I am now the Very Reverend Dan Justin. I am both the Rector of St. Michael and All Angels and the Co-Dean of Deanery 2. But please, as always, just call me Dan.

The Season of Advent

To dream of a world of peace and justice, where God's goodness is all in all, and to wake to the realization, is a cherished human hope. 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Art Show and Sale



n Sunday, December 2nd, during coffee hour we have a special opportunity to view (and potentially purchase) the art and jewelry of Sandy VanderMey.

Sandy is new to our parish. She was on a run last March and decided to stop poke her head into the parish on a Sunday morning to see what this place was all about. She has been attending ever since. Sandy is an artist. Her work has been featured all over the world. She won first place awards in national and international art competitions for her unusual metalwork. She exhibited her jewelry and wall sculpture in galleries around the world including Great Britain, South Korea, Japan and Germany. Vogue Magazine commissioned her to design bracelets. Sandra's first wall piece "Winterplanes" was selected by the Smithsonian for the Air and Space Museum. The Smithsonian Magazine along with numerous other periodicals, newspapers and international publications, Ornament magazine, Metalsmith Magazine, American Craft magazine featured her metalwork. Public and private collectors, galleries and interior designers commissioned her wall work. With almost eighty galleries and stores worldwide selling Sandy's iewelry, from Colorado ski resorts, Caesar's Palace and the New York Holography museum to Neiman Marcus, her career bloomed.

Sandra's first Master's degree she earned from the University of Iowa


where she focused on coloring "exotic" metals, specifically creating thin-film interference colors on reactive metals, titanium, niobium and tantalum. Her second Masters, a Masters in Fine Arts degree was in holography and reactive metals. Sandra was distinguished by being the first student in the history of the University of Iowa to graduate with honors from their School of Art and Art History. After graduating she taught metalsmithing at lowa State University, University of Iowa and Dordt college before moving to Los Angeles. Three weeks later she received a contract from Disney studios to do jewelry for Disneyland. Soon after she began her career with Star Trek creating wall sculpture for the television shows. She produced numerous art pieces for the ships in all three Star Trek series, Next Generation, Voyager and Enterprise. Her art also appeared in Star Trek's video games and in the feature film Star Trek Insurrection.

Sandy says "I make jewelry and wall sculpture with titanium, niobium and tantalum. I'm able

to get a wide range of intense color through an electrolytic process called anodizing on the surface of these "reactive" metals. Through a masking process my wall work is very colorful and pictorial. I like most to create sky objects and aerial views of landscapes on my titanium. My jewelry is a combination of colorful titanium, sterling silver and a brilliantly colored material called niobium. I am inspired working with reactive metals. With titanium, tantalum and niobium I have discovered the best of two worlds, the beauty of an intense and pure painterly pallet and a tactile sense derived from working with metal. Both provide the perfect vehicle for expressing my abiding love for nature."

It is not unusual to see a family take their presents back to their shelter to open on Christmas, gifts are that precious. We also treat the moms to massages and gift bags of their own. Holiday Cheer provides a safe place for families of all ages.





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




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VESTRY
