## Rector to Begin Doctor of Ministry Program

ne of my greatest joys as a priest is the opportunity to preach sermons each Sunday. Of all the work that I am called to do—preaching is by far my favorite. Each Tuesday I begin reading and reflecting on the scriptures that will be read on Sunday. I pray with them; I think about them; I ask questions about them. On Wednesday I usually spend about half my day studying the text using a variety of different commentaries. By Thursday I hope to have narrowed down the topic enough to know which of the four readings-Old Testament, Psalm, New Testament, or Gospel—that I want to preach on. Sometimes I combine a couple of the readings. Only a few times have I managed to touch on all four in a sermon. I spend the better part of Thursday doing an in-depth study of the text that I am going to be preaching on. I do some brainstorming and hard thinking in order to find interesting ways to present the sermon. That means I am searching for just the right story or illustration in order to make the sermon interesting. Each day of the week I spend time praying about the sermon. I ask God to open my heart and mind. I ask the Holy Spirit to speak and help me be creative. On Friday morning I turn on my computer and I write the sermon. Often times by Friday I have a hand written outline of what I want to say. Friday morning I piece it all together. By Friday afternoon I am preaching the sermon to an empty church and making necessary edits and corrections. Once those are done, I am done. I don't touch my sermon again until Sunday morning.

There are some weeks that my sermon seems to fly from my heart right onto the page with ease. Other weeks it is sheer agony. Fresh ideas seem to hide from me and I have to pull them out kicking and screaming. On those weeks I spend a lot of time praying on Saturday and Sunday that God will use my sermon despite its deficiencies to speak to you all. In fact, now that I think about, I am rarely happy with a sermon that I have written. That is when I must remember that Jesus is still alive and active today. The Holy Spirit will use whatever I present in the way the Spirit chooses. But deep

down, I always think that I could have done better.

Actually, the fact is that I can do better. And I want to do better. One of the ordination vows a priest makes asks, "Will you be diligent in the reading and study of



the Holy Scriptures, and in seeking the knowledge of such things as may make you a stronger and more able minister of Christ?" The newly ordained answers, "I will." That means that as a priest I am committed to doing better! I must

grow and challenge myself in all areas of my ministry to grow and be better.

I don't just want to be a good preacher; I want to be a great preacher! To this end, in my desire to grow and get better, I am extremely proud to say that I am about to embark on a new seminary degree. I have applied for and been accepted to the Doctor of Ministry in Biblical Preaching program at Luther Seminary. Like most Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) degrees, the program at Luther Seminary requires a three week period of intensive, residential course work on the campus each summer for a period of three years. The remainder of the work is done within the parish setting. Luther Seminary is an Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) seminary. The Episcopal Church and the ELCA are in full communion with one another.

I selected Luther Seminary because I believe it currently has the premier program in homiletics (the study of preaching). Luther's faculty are on the cutting edge of scholarship in this field. Luther Seminary's WorkingPreacher.org website is one of the best resources available for clergy preparing sermons. The seminary, located in St. Paul, MN, only accepts twelve to eighteen new students into the D.Min. program each year.

I am incredibly grateful to the vestry and the parish for their decision to support me as I pursue this new degree. I am convinced that it will not only benefit me, but it will also benefit the parish. I begin the program this summer and therefore will be studying at the seminary for most of the month of June. I will be away for a total of three Sundays. I am pleased to announce that the Rev. Canon Mark Shier will once again return to St. Michael's to preside and preach during my three weeks away.

I ask for your prayers as I begin this new endeavor. I cannot tell you how excited I am to study, learn, grow and then return to St. Michael's. And on a side note, it is also a bit of a running joke with my friends that I am becoming a one person ecumenical movement. I grew up in a non-denominational church, attended a Southern Baptist college, a Presbyterian seminary, was ordained as an Episcopalian, and now will get a Doctor of Ministry from the Lutherans. But I guess that is okay. After all, we are all a part of the Body of Christ and I think we should and could do a better job of working together anyway.

On Wednesday, March 6, 2013, I took Father Dan as my guest to an ICUJP-sponsored luncheon on immigration reform. ICUJP is the Interfaith Communities United for Justice & Peace. Immigration reform is a topic our committee will be addressing this spring in a Crucial Conversation (date TBD).

Also we will be joining NRCAT (National Religious Campaign Against Torture) to protest the use of prolonged solitary confinement in U.S. prisons as part of a larger focus on prison reform—also being

addressed by our partner PCU (Progressive Christians Uniting) in their "Justice Not Jails" campaign.

Dan will also be joining me on May 22 for the annual "Giants of Justice" luncheon sponsored by CLUE (Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice) which focuses on workers' rights. We have stood vigil in the past with car wash workers and grocery workers.

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## Spring Arrives in the Meditation Garden

e're happy to report that our new Meditation Garden is taking shape and will be completed very soon—sometime in mid- to late-April. This project started almost a year ago, when we learned that the six large pine trees in the garden were no longer safe and had to be removed. Although that was a painful decision that dramatically changed the Meditation Garden, the Vestry focused on the positive and, in the spirit of Easter, envisioned a new beginning for an old garden. Now that vision is finally coming to life.

Before talking about the wonderful new features you will see in the garden, let me tell you about a few important things you can't see. During construction, we discovered that the main water supply line feeding the church and the classroom buildings was badly damaged and had been poorly repaired—a crisis waiting to happen. It was replaced entirely with a brand new copper pipe, all the way to the DWP line on Coldwater Canyon. The garden's drainage system was half-covered and always inadequate, resulting in a swimming pool effect during severe storms. To ensure proper drainage in the future, we added a retaining wall on the south-side of the garden and new drains throughout the garden and at the sidewalk leading into the sacristy. We also installed a new irrigation system in the garden, together with a new state-of-the-art sprinkler control system for the entire campus. With these changes, we hope our new garden will be not only beautiful, but also structurally sound.

Now for what you can see. In short, we believe the Meditation Garden will be more beautiful and functional than ever. The central feature will be a prayer labyrinth, which will provide a tranquil place for contemplation and prayer, but will also double as a patio that will accommodate a variety of church services and special occasions. To create space for the labyrinth, the fountain has been moved against the east brick wall and restyled in a manner consistent with the church's contemporary architecture. A new altar and benches will be placed in



front of the fountain, providing a place to perform church services with a beautiful waterfall as background. For plantings, we will enjoy a new hedgerow along the south fence to provide privacy for the garden and the church, four new shade trees on the corners of the labyrinth, which will eventually spread across the entire labyrinth and garden, and a variety of other new plants and grass to create a vibrant green space. We are also painting the support beams extending from the church, the exterior doors of the church and the garden fence, all to match the rest of the campus, and we will install a new spring latch on the gate so that it will not need to be locked. Finally, we will keep a nook in the northwest corner for our old friend and garden overseer, St. Francis (or at least his statute, which has been a feature of the garden for many years).

We hope all of you will find many ways to enjoy the new Meditation Garden. It has been a long time coming, but certainly worth the wait!

## A New Affiliated Clergyperson to Join St. Michael's

t is my great pleasure to announce that St. Michael's will soon welcome a new clergy person to our pastoral team. Stefanie Wilson is currently finishing her Master of Divinity at the General Theological Seminary. She will be ordained to the Transitional Diaconate on June 8, 2013, at St. John's Pro-Cathedral. Stefanie will then be ordained a priest in January, 2014.

Stefanie has been hired as the new, full-time Senior High Chaplain at Campbell Hall and will begin her ministry at the school on July 1, 2013. All clergy ordained in the Diocese of Los Angeles must also be affiliated with a local parish where they will have the opportunity to perform the Sacramental duties of their ministry. Our bishops, deployment officer, and the Headmaster at Campbell Hall each recommended that Stefanie affiliate with St. Michael and All Angels.

In March I had the opportunity to meet with this dynamic young woman. I was instantly impressed by her enthusiasm, energy, and passion for ministry. She has a deep love and is called to minister to children and teens. She is incredibly gifted in liturgy. She served as the chief sacristan at General Theological Seminary (and yes, that is a really big deal!).

Stefanie will begin her ministry with us sometime in mid-July. In her first six months here she will serve as a deacon on Sundays. She will join me in preaching duties offering sermons perhaps once per month or every other month. Once she is ordained a priest she will also preside on a regular basis. We must remember that Stefanie is employed full-time at Campbell Hall and is only going to be at St. Michael's on Sundays.

In addition to her liturgical roles, Stefanie eagerly agreed to take over leadership of the Youth Ministry here at St. Michael's. I cannot wait to see what God will do with this group now that they will have a leader dedicated to this ministry. While I certainly love youth ministry, I must confess that I have found it difficult to devote the time and attention to developing the youth ministry in the light of all my other responsibilities as rector.

Prior to seminary and ordination Stefanie was a school teacher in Chicago. She is originally from Orange County.

I am sure you will join with me in warmly welcoming Stefanie to our parish. I know she is looking forward to meeting you and serving as an affiliated deacon and priest in this parish.

## It's Time Again to GET ON THE BUS!

or those of you not familiar with Get On The Bus (GOTB) it is a program that reunites children with their mothers and fathers in prison for Mother's Day and Father's Day. This year we are changing directions and assisting buses for Mother's Day, going to two new locations.

- Jane Wilson will ride the bus to Folsom Prison for Women on May 17th. This new women's facility is north of Sacramento. It's a very long trip and as you can imagine the women and their families are absolutely devastated by this distance. There is no way most of the families can afford the time or expense to travel that far to visit their moms. The event is bound to be incredibly emotional.
- Julie Bellevue will be riding a bus on Saturday, May 18th, to the Female Rehabilitation Correctional Complex in Bakersfield. This is a prison rehab and GOTB's first time at this facility. The bus will have all family members and not just children. These women are handpicked to go to this rehab and it is part of their program to actively try to repair family bonds.

How can you get involved with Get On The Bus this year? You can donate items and your time! Look for sign up sheets at the back of the church and in the Ministry Center:

- Breakfast items such as pastries, granola bars, orange juice, juice boxes, nonperishable fruit and water.
- Fun things for the "stay connected" bags.
   These are given to the children on the ride back home. We supply cards, paper, envelopes, stickers, crayons, pens/colored pencils, drawing paper, stamps, etc. so the children can write letters back to their moms. [The 99¢ store is a great place to shop.]
- Help assemble the breakfast and "stay connected" bags during coffee hour.
- Volunteer to deliver the breakfasts and "stay connected" bags to the buses (time and location to be determined). It's fun to meet the families and give them a warm send off.

Most of the boys and girls have not seen their mom for years. Let's make this a wonderful day of reuniting families and strengthening the bond that will hold them close until they are back together again.


The following are reflections from some of the members:

any challenge, or for positive things.

Whether doing a LEV visit, visiting a sick parishioner or even in my services with prisoners at Twin Towers through the PRISM project, I have found that I am the child still growing in my faith and learning from so many who are so deep in their faith and love of God.—Betty Ferrell


