The Book of Acts and the "E" Word We All Fear

The stone has been rolled away.
Alleluia, Christ is risen! The church
now enters the great fifty days of Easter. You
may have already noticed, but our scripture
lessons on Sunday mornings have taken an
interesting shift—the Old Testament lesson
has been replaced by a reading from the Acts
of the Apostles. What is that about?

The book of Acts is an interesting book of the Bible. We are not always sure what to make of it. It is not a Gospel like Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John. It is not a letter like the Epistles of St. Paul, St. Peter, or St. James. It is not a sermon like Hebrews or prophecy like the Revelation. Acts almost seems like a book of history—a narrative which tells us all about how the earliest followers of Jesus lived and organized themselves and spread out with their message across the known world. But the history we read in Acts does not always match up with the accounts we read in other places in the New Testament. We call the book "The Acts of the Apostles" but that might not be the best name for it. It is really only about a couple of Apostles. Most of the original twelve don't really show up in the book at all. The first half of the book is about Peter. The second half is about Paul. Mixed in with them we get some cameo appearances from James. We are also introduced to some new people that certainly were not apostles. So what is Acts?

Acts is actually the second part of a two-volume work of literature. Volume one is what we know as the Gospel of Luke. The same author who wrote Luke also wrote Acts. They were intended to be read together as a consistent narrative. The two volumes—Luke and Acts—have a consistent theology, style, and message. Both books were written by a person named Theophilus (there are lots of theories on the identity of Theophilus, but that is too much to go into here). Some have argued that Luke is the story of Jesus and that Acts is the story of the Holy Spirit. Acts is not actually intended to be a book of history. Rather, Luke wrote Acts as a book

of theology—but that theology is told on the stage of history. So the book is far more interested in theology than history. Of course, we do learn a great deal from the history told in Acts. It is just that history is not the primary goal.



Acts is a bridge between the Gospels and the Epistles of the New Testament. Acts reveals how the followers of Jesus were transformed and empowered by the Holy Spirit and spread out across the known world sharing the Good News of God

in Christ. Acts shows how the church came to be and how it ordered itself. Acts shows how this group of believers in Jesus came to be the new community God envisioned and liberated humanity to be. Without reading Acts we cannot hope to understand the

rest of the New Testament. In fact, without reading Acts, we cannot fully comprehend the story of Salvation as it is presented through the entire Bible—the story told from Genesis to Revelation cannot be comprehended without reading the book of Acts. It is Acts that most clearly connects the Old Testament to the New and the Gospels to the Epistles. And finally, Acts reveals what it means to be the witnesses for Christ that Jesus asks all his followers to be.

And that is why we read this book in the season of Easter. Both because it connects the glorious events of the Gospels and Holy Week to the remaining portions of scripture and because at the end of the Gospel stories, Jesus tells his followers that they are to be his witnesses to all the world. As followers of Jesus today we are still meant to be witnesses for Christ. But for Episcopalians that can be a very scary thought. It brings us to the "E" word that we all tend to fear: Evangelism.

In our baptismal covenant we vow to "Proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ." This is our post-Easter mission given to us by the Risen Christ. But the idea of evangelism gives us the heebee jeebees. We imagine those who knock on doors or hand out tracks. We think of those who are always trying to convince everyone to believe the way they believe. Our minds conjure up those who are self-righteous and telling everyone to repent or burn. But that is not what evangelism really is.

Evangelism is really nothing more than the willingness to share your story of gratitude for God's grace in your life. It is based on our deep delight in the community of the church and our love for God. It is grounded on the understanding that God loves each and every person—that the criteria for being God's beloved is being born a human being.

When we have the opportunity to share stories of our gratitude for God's grace in our lives we never know what might happen. This is a spiritual practice and our trust is in the Holy Spirit. We need no further agenda. Our goals in being witnesses to God's amazing love are not that someone will be converted or even that they will join St. Michael's. Our job is to be a witness and the best way to do that is to share our stories. The Holy Spirit is present and active in the lives of people. We never know what may happen. Perhaps your story will touch another's heart. Perhaps your sharing will encourage them. Maybe that person will want to know more about the faith. Maybe someone will want to come to St. Michael's and join the community. Maybe any number of things will happen. What happens when we share the Good News of God in Christ and our delight in God's grace is not our business. That is God's job. God knows why you were there to share with that particular person at that particular time. We have no way of knowing what God is doing in another person's life at any given time. Our role is to be witnesses—to share our stories of gratitude for God's grace in our lives. The Spirit's role is to do the rest.

The Acts of the Apostles is filled with tales of people sharing their stories of God's grace in Jesus Christ. In the book of Acts the Holy Spirit uses those words to do amazing things. As we read the book of Acts in church this year, let us remember Christ's call to His followers to be his witnesses. Let us no longer fear the "E" word. After all, we are just telling our stories of God's grace to those we love.

It's Time Again to GET ON THE BUS!

or many years, St. Michael's has been involved with Get on the Bus, a program that takes children to visit their parent in prison. This year we are helping out with a bus that is going to the men's prison at Folsom, north of Sacramento, on Saturday, July 26th. Children with a parent or caregiver climb on the bus for the long ride. There are activity bags with fun things to do as well as videos and lots of snacks to keep them busy until they take a nap before arriving at the prison. Once there, they have a visit with their father and do activities with him like playing soccer, board games, and always quiet conversations as many may not have seen or talked to their dad for a long time. After lunch and more fun, it's time to go. Tearful goodbyes are said and the children head back to the bus and find a letter and stuffed bear from dad that helps with the sadness. There is also paper to write letters back to dad in order to stay connected until the next visit.

How can you get involved with Get On The Bus this year? You can donate items and your time!

Look for sign-up sheets at the back of the church and in the Ministry Center starting Sunday, June 29th:

- Fun items for "activity" bags for things to do on the long ride to the prison such as coloring books, crayons, drawing paper, pens and markers, books, magazines, small games, snacks, etc.
- Fun things for the "stay-connected" bags like cards, paper, envelopes, crayons, pens/colored pencils, drawing paper, stamps, etc. so the children can write letters back to their dads.
- The 99¢ store is a great place to shop. No glue, stickers, or glitter as they are not allowed in the prison!
- Help assemble activity and stay-connected bags on Sunday, July 20th, at Coffee Hour after the 10:30 am service in the Ministry Center.



 Volunteer to deliver the activity and stay-connected bags to the buses (time and location to be determined). It's fun to meet the families and give them a warm send off.

Most of the boys and girls have not seen their dad for years. Let's make this a wonderful day of reuniting families and strengthening the bond that will hold them close until they are back together again.


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Vision Statement
