A Holy Lent By the Very Reverend Dan Justin

n March 5th I will stand before the congregation and invite you, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent. What exactly is Lent and how can we make it holy? For many, Lent is a season of giving up chocolate or exercising more than normal, or not watching as much television. But all of those things can be fairly meaningless if we do not understand why we are doing them. I have also heard it said that Lent is that season of the church year when we remember just how bad we are. Some assume Lent is all about our sinfulness and therefore a need to grovel before God. But that too is a misunderstanding. Focusing on giving things up or just on how bad of people we are is actually the opposite of a holy Lent.

The season of Lent, in the history of the church, was the final period of preparation for those who were soon to be baptized in the church. It was not until the fourth century that the season of Lent began to last for a period of forty days. In fact, from the fourth century until the seventh century it only lasted thirty six days. In the seventh century someone figured out that they should add the four days from Ash Wednesday to the first Sunday of Lent to round up to an actual forty days. This period of preparation was marked by prayer, fasting, and acts of service as the new converts sought to live more like the example Jesus provides.

Our prayer book indicates that Lent was also a time "For those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful, were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church." Lent was the time to come back to Church after falling away for some reason. It was a time to seek forgiveness.

So Lent, according to the prayer book, is about preparing for baptism, reconciliation, and restoration. Three wonderful and beautiful things that all communicate the unmerited and free grace of a God who promises that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Why then do we think that Lent is all about sin and reminding ourselves of our depravity? That is not the message of Lent at all. The message of Lent is the message that "God so



loved the world that God gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16). It is because of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus that these three wonderful and beautiful things, ren in baptism

adoption as God's children in baptism, reconciliation, and restoration, are available to us. Jesus brings God's salvation to us, freely. But it came with a price.

And so this year I invite you to a holy Lent. Not a Lent in which you give up things just for sake of giving them up, nor a Lent in which you beat yourself up over a list of vices. But rather a holy Lent which takes time to remember the gift of Jesus. A holy Lent where you focus on your relationship with God and growth in faith through things like self-examination, prayer, fasting, self-denial, reading and reflecting on God's holy Word, and yes, even repentance. And we do these things because we know that God freely offers adoption, reconciliation and restoration. The message of Lent is good news. God loves us; God made a way for us; God has redeemed us. We join the pilgrim road of Lent, walking with Jesus as he gives his life for the life of the world. Through our Lenten disciplines we will identify with the sufferings of Jesus, experiencing and living into his amazing love. And our goal is to learn to live like our Lord, Master, and Savior lived. That, my friends, will be a holy Lent indeed.

Duane has worked as a church musician for 43 years, most recently as the organist at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Fullerton where he was for 11 years. After 7 years of piano lessons, he began studying the organ at the age of 12 and took his first church job only 6 years later. He has played in Episcopal, Congregational, Methodist, and Presbyterian churches. He holds two degrees in organ performance.

Duane has a deep interest in liturgy and in the past has even helped me to navigate special services (particularly Evensong). I asked Duane to share a bit about his knowledge and how he came to it.

"I gained my knowledge of Anglican liturgy through lots of reading and observation going back to high school ... I had an interest in the organ as long as I can remember and certainly by the time I was in high school I was fascinated by liturgy and wanted to know much more. I remember looking forward to the Christmas morning broadcasts from the National Cathedral. That was a glimpse into something utterly unlike anything I had experienced."

"My second organ teacher was organist at the Episcopal church in my home town and I occasionally played a prelude or postlude. By the time I was in college I had all but become Episcopalian. My first two organ positions were at Episcopal churches and I was finally confirmed in 1976 while in graduate school."

What Happened to the Doxology?!

ach Sunday, as our offerings of money Land food are brought to the altar, we sing what is known as the Doxology. "Praise God from whom all blessings flow..." But you may notice as we move into Lent that the Doxology has been replaced. Now, I know how difficult change can be, so I wanted to explain that decision. As the seasons of the Church year change we also change our liturgy to reflect the various themes of the new season. We actually change lots of different things in the service—the colors in the church, the vestments, the service music, the prayers of the people—each of these changes with the seasons. As we enter the season of Lent this year we have decided to change from the Doxology to what is known as a presentation hymn.

This Lent, as our gifts of money and food are brought to the altar, we will sing the first stanza of hymn 149. "Eternal Lord of love, behold your Church walking once more the pilgrim way of Lent, led by your cloud by day, by night your fire, moved by your love and toward your presence bent: far off yet here—the goal of all desire."

These words will be for us a prayer as we offer our gifts and our lives to God. A prayer which acknowledges that we are seeking to walk toward God, our goal is to be in God's presence. It is our deepest desire. And we know that God will answer our prayer in the gift of the Eucharist. This presentation hymn will help us connect more deeply with the season of Lent. And of course, after these forty days have come to an end, that stone has been rolled away, and the alleluias are again on our lips, we will once again sing with all our hearts, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

A lthough 2014 began on January 1st, the year for St. Michael's really began with the Annual Meeting on Sunday, January 19th. At the Annual Meeting we shared a wonderful potluck lunch and we reflected on the many successful worship and outreach activities we had the previous year. This year we thanked Sarah Cook and Meredith Reese for their outstanding service on the Vestry and we welcomed Julie Bellevue, Gail Green, Jenni Hernandez, and Ron Schwartz who were newly elected to the Vestry. (Gail and Ron have previously served on the Vestry.)

On February 7–8, 2014, the Vestry held a retreat at the Loft in the Ministry Center. This was an opportunity for each Vestry member to share the story of their own personal spiritual journey. We also discussed the roles and responsibilities of Vestry members and Vestry liaison positions to the various parish commissions. The Vestry elects a Junior Warden each year and this year Ron Schwartz was elected to the Junior Warden position. (Please see a separate article about Ron in this issue.)

What a difference two years make! February 5th marked the two year anniversary of Father Dan's first Sunday with us. St. Michael's is a very different place than it was two years ago. Physically the entire campus has been renovated. Spiritually we have seen a renewal and a deepening of our faith and commitment that matches, or surpasses, the physical change in the campus. Every day we are grateful that God brought Father Dan and St. Michael's together!

As we move into Lent and prepare for Easter, we continue to pray for all that God has given to St. Michael's and that we may continue to grow in our faith.

n February 16, many members of our parish were confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church by the Bishop Suffragan Mary D. Glasspool. Included in the group of confirmands, were several members of the St. Michael's Youth Group.

A week after the confirmation, I asked Youth Group members Nikolay, Vitaly, and Masha Best what is was like for them to be confirmed.

In preparation for confirmation, all of

those participating met with Fr. Dan for two classes to learn more about the Episcopal Church, its history, its liturgy, and more. Nikolay, Vitaly, and Masha expressed that they most enjoyed learning about how the church is structured. Vitaly enjoyed learning about General Convention and the way decisions are made, and looking at the robes we use in church. Masha and Nikolay enjoyed learning about the different roles of deacons, priests, and bishops.

We also talked about the experience of being confirmed: being presented by the congregation, making promises to renew their

commitment to Christ, kneeling in front of the bishop, and having her hands laid on them. Masha worried that it would be scary, but said that it "felt really spiritual." Vitaly enjoyed meeting and talking to the bishop. He said, "Kneeling in front of the bishop didn't feel weird or anything. She is a normal person...I felt glad that I did it." He said that it was fun and a different experience than baptism. Nikolay agreed, "I never thought that having

hands laid on by a bishop would be so holy. It felt so great. When I got baptized, it was water being poured on me and the Holy Spirit being received, but having hands laid on me by the bishop was something that you could feel. It was special."

When I asked each of the Bests why they got confirmed, they all expressed their love for being a part of the St. Michael and All Angels community. For example, when I told Vitaly that some people explain confirmation for teenagers as

a way to signify that you are an adult in the church, he looked at me confused. He said, "I never felt like I wasn't." He feels like he has always been accepted and fully a part of the church. He likes how friendly the church is and that "they allow anybody and everybody to come in."

Masha felt that she too is already a part of the church as an acolyte and a member of the Youth Group. Confirmation was another way to be more a part of the church. For her, "confirmation made it official."

Nikolay explained, "I really like the church. I love the people in the

church. I love being part of the Youth Group." He described that when he was confirmed, he was "uniting with the people in the church."

At the close of our conversation, all three agreed that anyone interested in being confirmed should definitely do it. In the words of Nikolay, "If you have the chance to be confirmed, be confirmed."


And if you're wondering what constitutes a "young adult," we generally have people in their 20s, 30s, and early 40s.


















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Vision Statement
