Summer in Salt Lake

he eyes of every Episcopalian will be on Salt Lake City, Utah, this summer. Well, that may be over selling it a bit. But, a rather large number of Episcopalians will be gathering in that city beginning June 25, 2015 for the 78th General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Our triennial convention welcomes deputations from every diocese in the church, along with every bishop of the church, to gather and take up the business of our denomination. The General Convention is the highest level of authority in the Episcopal Church. When it gathers it is the largest democratic body in the world.

Any decision about the life, worship, polity, doctrine, or discipline of our church must come through the General Convention. No one person or small group makes decisions alone. We make them together. Resolutions and canonical changes are discussed and voted on. The Convention is modeled after the United States government. There are two houses—the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops. In order for a resolution to pass it must be voted on and approved by both houses. General Convention reminds us that we are not alone. St. Michael's is part of a much larger whole. We need one another. Individual parishes cannot (and should not) make arbitrary decisions to change things like liturgical rites or traditions. To do that, separate from the General Convention, is to say that we don't need one another. That is not how the Episcopal Church operates. That is why I say all Episcopal eyes will be on Salt Lake City this summer. The 78th General Convention will consider some very important issues.

First, and possibly the most visible, will be the election of the next Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. Our current Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Katherine Jefforts Schori, completes her term this summer. The bishop elected to this office serves for a nine year term. Only the bishops of the church are allowed to vote in this election. A nominating committee has considered a number of potential candidates and has produced four nominees. These include the Rt.

Rev. Thomas Breidenthal, Bishop of Southern Ohio, The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, Bishop of North Carolina, the Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas, Bishop of Connecticut, and the Rt. Rev. Dabney Smith, Bishop of Southwest Florida. Many



have wondered why there are no female bishops included on the slate of nominees. According to reports from our own bishops, there is currently only one eligible female bishop, the Rt. Rev. Mary Gray Reeves, Bishop of El Camino Real. She decided she

did not want to run due to personal reasons. It will be very interesting to see who the bishops select to be our next Presiding Bishop.

Second, and possibly the most controversial, will be the consideration of the report of the Task Force on the Study of Marriage. This Task Force was given the mandate to study the theological, historical, liturgical, and canonical dimensions of marriage. The church must respond to the changing understanding of marriage in our country. This report considers numerous trends in marriage, including samesex marriage. The report offers a number of resolutions for the Convention to consider. If you are interested in reading this 122 page report you may download it at the General Convention website.

Third, the 78th General Convention will consider the report of the Task Force for Reimagining the Episcopal Church. This group sought to examine the operations of the national church and make recommendations on ways to eliminate bureaucracy, save money, streamline process, and support local parish ministry. The Task Force has called for many and significant changes, including significant changes to the way the General Convention is organized and operated. This lengthy report is also available to be downloaded and read at the General Convention website.

And of course, in addition to these three major issues, there will be countless other resolutions considered, rejected, and approved by Convention. Some of them may very



well impact our life and worship here at St. Michael's. Others will go into the books and be quickly forgotten about. Such is the work of General Convention.

If you are really intrigued, you are always welcome to travel to Salt Lake City to be an observer of all the action. You can't vote but you can watch. There are also some wonderful exhibits available. You will have to pay an admissions fee to get in though. If you go, please be sure to pick up a souvenir for me. Vestments are always the best choice for me! And there will be plenty of companies selling those.

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Get On The Bus!

any thanks to all of you who gave so generously of your time and donations to make Get On The Bus a special time for the children going to see their dads at the California Men's Colony prison in San Luis Obispo. It is so typical of the community support for outreach projects at St. Michael's.

The deadline for this article is before the trip so I'll tell you what will happen. Some of us will meet in the upper parking lot at 3:30 am on Saturday morning on May 30th where we will carpool to the location of the bus at Mt. St. Mary's Doheny Campus in downtown Los Angeles to welcome the families before they leave for CMC at 4:45 am—a long and early trip for all. After a nap and breakfast, the children will use the items in their backpack/activity bag to keep them occupied until the bus arrives at the prison about 8:00am.

After they clear security, the children will greet their dads in the visiting room with squeals, hugs, and kisses. Along with the quiet conversations there will be board games and outside activities such as soccer and playing catch and they will also have their picture taken with dad to take home (dad gets the picture too). Then lunch, and more visiting. The children and dads will say a tearful goodbye then it will be time to board the bus about 2:00 pm. There will be a bear and a letter from dad on the bus for each child. Before heading back to LA, the children will go to a party at Congregation Beth David where they will wind down, play, and have snacks. A counselor will be there if any want to talk about their experience.

On the way home, the children and family members usually take a nap or read quietly until they return to LA about 7:30 pm exhausted. In the days and weeks following the trip, they will have stationary and stamps to send letters back to dad and stay connected.

Again, thank you for making this visit to dad so special for all the children.



The timeline for the episcopal election has not changed. The 2016 Diocesan Convention will elect the next bishop. The Bishop Coadjutor will be consecrated in 2017. That person will then serve alongside Bishop Bruno until his retirement in 2018. He or she will then become the Bishop of Los Angeles.


