Change is in the Air

s our new program year begins, change is in the air! I understand that change is often difficult for people, especially Episcopalians. Depending on the situation, change could be seen as essential, inevitable, healthy, anxiety producing, refreshing, uncomfortable, exciting, or annoying. Like it or not, though, things do indeed change and there are many changes on the horizon here at St. Michael's. The September issue of the parish newsletter is always a good place to explore change happening in the parish. After all, we are beginning a new program year. We have many different things planned; there are exciting events on the calendar. There are also some changes, some of which will require a period of adjustment, while others we will want to celebrate. The most visible change this year is the number of new faces around the place. So, what's changing, and who are all these new people?

This year we will have a change in the Episcopacy. If you follow news about the Diocese, then you already know—we have a new Bishop. In July of 2017, the Rt. Rev. John Taylor was ordained and consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Los Angeles. Bishop Taylor will succeed Bishop Bruno as our Diocesan Bishop in December of 2017. This change in leadership will certainly bring change in the diocese. It is always important for Episcopalians to remember, the Bishop is the Chief Pastor of every parish and mission in the diocese. The ministry of the clergy both priests and deacons—is an extension of the Bishop's ministry. We serve on the bishop's behalf. I invite you to join me in regularly praying for our new bishop. St. Michael's has the opportunity to meet Bishop Taylor on Sunday, September 17, 2017. He will be joining us for Duane's retirement party. He will also be presiding, preaching, and confirming people that day.

And that leads me to another big change this year. Duane Steadman, our faithful and

talented Parish Administrator, is retiring. His final day in the office will be September 15, 2017. Duane has served as our Parish Administrator for twelve and a half years. As a retirement gift, the parish commissioned the St. Michael's Mass, an original setting of the mass composed by Craig Phillips, in Duane's



honor. The music will premiere on Sunday, September 17th. We will continue to use this setting of the mass for our service music (Gloria, Sanctus, Fraction Anthem, Kyrie, and Angus Dei) through Advent of this year. The music will be unfamiliar at first, but over time we

will learn it and be able to sing it with great joy.

These days, if you stop by the office during the week, you will have the opportunity to meet Mark Gaddis, our new Parish Administrator. He began working at St. Michael's in mid-July, giving him two full months of training with Duane. You will find a bio and introduction about Mark later in this newsletter. As a parish, we have gotten comfortable and familiar with the way Duane operates and manages the many tasks on the Administrator's plate. Mark is learning quickly. However, as this change and transition occurs, we will need to be patient and understanding. Mark may do things differently than Duane. There could even be some changes in the way bulletins or announcements look. That is okay. Things are changing.

s I mentioned previously, Mark is not the only new face you will see around St. Michael's this year. This summer we welcomed the Rev. Patti Sells as our deacon. Rev. Patti will continue to be visibly involved in the liturgy on Sunday mornings. The Episcopal liturgy includes numerous elements that have always been designed to be completed by a deacon. These liturgical elements help communicate the role and function of deacons in the church. A deacon brings the church to the world, and the world to the church. A deacon spans the gap between the parish and the surrounding community. Deacons are ordained to a special ministry of service. Therefore, in the liturgy, deacons process the Gospel to the center of the community, reading the words and teachings of Jesus. Deacons bid the confession of sin. Deacons prepare the table for Eucharist, and also clean up after the meal. Deacons dismiss the congregation to go out to the world, where the gospel will be lived.

In addition to her liturgical roles, Patti will also be taking an active role in our Outreach Commission. She will partner with Julie Bellevue Smollar, becoming one of the coleaders of outreach. She will assist through managing communications and helping keep everyone in the loop about outreach events, meetings, efforts, and results. This edition of the newsletter contains an introduction so we can get to know Patti and her background a bit better.

In addition to Rev. Patti as our new deacon, we will also be welcoming a new seminarian this year. Field Education (commonly known as an internship) is a vital part of any seminary education. It provides the person preparing for Holy Orders an opportunity to get much needed practical experience. St. Michael's has previously welcomed two different seminarians—Katie Cadigan and Christopher Montella. Both our previous seminarians are now priests serving in parishes in this diocese. Katie is now the Associate Rector at St. Augustine's-by-the-Sea in Santa Monica. Christopher recently began serving as the Associate for Family Ministries at St. Wilfred's of York in Huntington Beach.

Jamie Barnett will begin her Field Education here at St. Michael's in September. Jamie is being sponsored for ordination by All Saints' Episcopal Church in Pasadena. She will be involved in a variety of different ministries. These will be determined by her learning goals and desired outcomes. She and I will meet on a regular basis to discuss her experiences and to reflect theologically on her successes and challenges. She will occasionally preach on Sunday mornings, lead the 9:15am Bible study, teach classes, visit the sick, and participate in the liturgical and community life of the parish. You will find an introduction to Jamie in this newsletter where you can read more about her background.

First, we are renaming our Sunday School. The new name is "St. Michael's Faith Factory." Amber, our Children's Pastor, has been working over the summer to make plans, prepare curriculum, develop ideas, and getting ready for a whole new year. The kids will be having lots of fun in Faith Factory, as well as learning a lot. See Amber's article about Faith Factory in this edition of the newsletter. Remember, we are always looking for volunteers in this ministry. Even if you can only serve one Sunday per year, Amber would love to talk with you.

In addition to Faith Factory, we are also beginning our brand new Middler Sunday School class. St. Michael's welcomes the Rev. Brian Gaeta-Symonds, who will be partnering with Rev. Stefanie, our Priest Associate, to offer a new opportunity for 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students. The Middlers will meet in the Blue Room on the first and third Sunday of each month. This schedule will get into full swing in October. In September, they will meet only on September 3rd as an introductory session. The group will not meet on the third Sunday in September (the 17th), due to Confirmation where most of the participants are being confirmed by the Bishop. Like all our Sunday school classes, the students will return to church at the peace. This new Middler class supplements our existing Youth Group program. Students are encouraged to participate in both. Rev. Brian is an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian (USA) Church. He and I went to seminary together and have been friends for many years. An introduction and short bio is available later in this newsletter where you can learn more about Brian.

So, those are some of the changes that are happening. There is plenty that is not

changing. We will still celebrate the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels on the last weekend of September. Our ever-popular Pet Blessing service will be on the first Sunday of October, just like always. The Stewardship campaign will run from October through the end of November. We will celebrate All Saints' Day the first weekend of November. Lessons and Carols is changing times, making it possible for more people to attend, but will still happen. Holiday Cheer is already in the early planning stages. We have a full schedule of Mid-Week classes for the fall, the topics of which will be presented in this edition of the newsletter.

We have a very exciting Program Year in store. God is moving at St. Michael and All Angels. Change is a symptom of growth. I am so grateful for the opportunity to grow together with you.



Our New (Official) Deacon

am honored and excited to officially be assigned as your deacon here at St Michael and All Angels. Now that that has happened, I thought it would be a good time to tell you little more about myself. I was ordained in 2001, at the Cathedral in Salt Lake City, Utah, where I also served for two years. I then moved to Washington State. During my 14 years in Washington, I served as deacon in two different parishes. I also regularly traveled with the Bishop on his visitations around the diocese. The diocese in that part of Washington State is called the Diocese of Olympia.

Over the course of my ordained ministry, I have run a food bank with about 20 volunteers, worked with a team to develop a cold weather shelter and meal program, and developed street ministry providing resources for homeless people and others. The ministry provided food, shelter, clothing and other basic needs. I have led several women's retreats, trained as a spiritual director, and served as a chaplain in a hospital.

Many may not realize that being a deacon is almost always volunteer service. In other words, deacons don't get paid by the church. My professional jobs took me in many directions, but focused mainly



around non-profit positions. I ran the yearly Homeless Count for our county in Washington, where I worked as the Coordinator of Housing and Homeless Services for the Department of Health and Human Services.

I moved to California in February of this year in order to be near my two grandchildren (whom many of you know, Amber and Andrew Russo being their parents). I have another daughter who now lives down the street from me, and a son who lives in Seattle.

As well as serving in the traditional diaconal roles in the liturgy on Sundays, I have begun working with the Outreach Committee. I look forward to any opportunities to serve God through serving others. I also look forward to getting know many of you. Please don't hesitate to introduce yourself.

Outside of work, Mark enjoys exploring other interests including acting in theater, film and television, as well as running half marathons. Our New Seminarian

St. Michaels is excited to welcome our new seminarian – Jamie Barnett. Jamie is in her third year at Bloy House, the Episcopal Seminary at Claremont School of Theology, and is delighted and excited to be joining all the folks at St Michael and All Angels (a group she describes as the friendliest, warmest congregation in the entire diocese). She will be with us this academic year completing her Field Education (commonly known as an internship).

In an effort to get to know Jamie better, a few facts about her might be useful! Jamie is originally from the south - Mississippi and Georgia. She attended the University of Mississippi, aka Ole Miss, where she majored in speech and theater with a minor in sociology! In fact, she left Mississippi after graduation and migrated west to work in the entertainment industry. Interestingly enough, she is still doing just that! Jamie works just up the street at CBS Studio Center where she heads up the grip department. She feels that she is fortunate to be the very first and still the only woman in studio history to ever hold that position. And, if you have always wondered what a grip does or what a Best Boy is, don't hesitate to ask her!

Jamie is being sponsored for ordination by All Saints' Episcopal Church in Pasadena. She has been a member there for over 20 years. She is a graduate of Education for Ministry, and By Your Side—a program of the diocese training lay leaders in compassionate presence with the terminally ill. 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advocacy group which you will hear more about in the weeks ahead.

After completing her discernment process at All Saints' Pasadena, Jamie was made a postulant for the priesthood by the Diocesan Commission on Ministry in April of 2015. Jamie served as a lay Eucharistic Minister, a Lay Eucharistic Visitor, a Lector, and a new member's small group leader while she was at All Saints.

Jamie lived in Burbank for 27 years, but for the past five years has lived in Pasadena. She considers her crowning achievement to have been the mothering and raising of six children—two who came with her marriage and four she and her former husband had of their own. All grown now, mostly living nearby, she also has four grandchildren, which she says are the greatest blessing of all. Now, she is looking forward to getting to know everyone at St. Michaels and discovering the wonderful and new things The Holy Spirit has in store for all of us together.


